

Relief Vet Job description.

Then you should consider becoming a high-volume spay/neuter veterinarian for Animal Rescue Coalition in sunny Sarasota Florida.

We are a non-profit with twenty years of providing high quality, high volume spay/neuter surgery just a few miles from the beautiful sands of Siesta Key Beach. We have a highly trained and professional support staff that follows high quality spay/neuter surgical protocols. Our schedule is split between public and rescue clientele.

We are looking to hire a relief spay/neuter surgical veterinarian to work one or two days per week. Our veterinarians will perform anywhere from 20 to 35 surgeries per day, but we understand you may need to work up to that number!!

Primary Responsibilities and Duties: Perform surgical sterilizations of both shelter and owned animals in a high volume, fast paced environment. Oversee and perform surgical monitoring, the administration of pre-anesthetic and anesthetic drugs and post-surgical monitoring through discharge. Comply with the applicable state and federal laws established by the Florida Veterinary Board of Medical Examiners and the U.S. Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA).

Veterinarian Requirements: A Degree in Veterinary Medicine from an accredited university of medicine. Obtain veterinary licensure in the state of FL. Two years of experience practicing veterinary medicine. Experience with high-volume spay/neuter (HQHVSN) surgeries. Experience with or training from ASPCA Humane Alliance of Asheville N.C. is preferred. Experience with high volume spay/neuter is preferred but evidence of speed and proficiency will be considered to provide opportunity for training to develop your skills.

Detailed description -

- Perform spay/neuter surgical procedures using techniques determined by Spay/Neuter Alliance
- Follow standardized surgical and anesthetic techniques and protocols
- Adopt and abide by all high volume spay/neuter standards as directed by ARC Medical Director for patient care and surgery
- Oversee all aspects of assigned patients, including (but not limited to): physical examination; surgery; pre- and post-operative care; anesthetic protocols; patient monitoring; and emergency response
- Supervise handling and recording of controlled substances by Veterinary Technicians
- Supervise post-operative rechecks and order of medical treatments, as necessary, to ensure complete surgical recovery
- Assess individual patient issues and provide reasonable and sensible solutions
- Communicate with clients and outside veterinary clinics related to adverse patient events when necessary
- Keep Medical Director apprised of any critical situations or issues, including attending all scheduled meetings
- Communicate any issues concerning staff or patients with Medical Director
- Communicate issues regarding the clinic's disease control protocols, surgical protocols, or other medical issues with the Medical Director
- Model a standard of continual commitment to improvement in all aspects of high volume spay/neuter care and handling of dogs and cats
- Behave in a manner that upholds both personal and professional standards, as an ambassador of the ASPCA, at all times
